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The Gift - Review

It's a **tricky** thing, reviewing a film like *The Gift*. By its very design, it's the kind of movie that works best if you know very **little** about it **before** watching; first-time director Joel Edgerton (who also **writes**,

produces and stars) has come up with a real edgeof-your-seat, tension-filled thriller here. It's not the kind of **story** that you think it might be during its opening **half**, but as it makes its way through **myriad** twists and turns it stays **remarkably consistent** with the characters and what we learn of their motivations.

Jason Bateman and Rebecca Hall play Simon and Robyn Callum, an outwardly-happy, **successful**

couple who have just moved into a beautiful home in the Hollywood Hills, below which the city of Los



Angeles shimmers like a - slightly alien, slightly menacing - dreamscape. A chance encounter with Gordo (Edgerton), who went to high school with Simon, leads to the odd figure offering the couple a series of extravagant welcome gifts, and then... Well, to say any more would spoil the surprise, but Bateman, Hall - and perhaps Edgerton most of all - are fantastic throughout.

The Gift is a remarkably assured debut picture. Influenced by films as **stylistically** diverse as Stanley Kubrick's *The Shining* (1980), Curtis Hanson's *The Hand That Rocks the Cradle* (1992), Park Chan-wook's *Oldboy* (2003) and Michael Haneke's *Caché* (2005), it's a **subtle**, psychological slow burn, and one that fans of any of the aforementioned would be well-advised to investigate.
